What exactly IS a Comrade Member? She is a member in good standing, who may vote and hold office in tents in which she is active, except the office of Tent President and/or Tent Treasurer. # **Our Virginia State Flag**

Many states did not have an official flag until the early 1890s. Virginia was different. The state legislature decided that an official flag was needed when Virginia succeeded from the Union in 1861. They seemed to be in a hurry as they did not design a new flag, but just took the front of the Virginia state seal and put it on a blue background.

The official seal of Virginia was designed in 1776 by a committee, but George Wythe has been given principle credit for the design. The design reflected the admiration of Virginians for the ancient Roman Republic.

Wythe's design featured the Goddess Virtus, portrayed as an Amazon with a bare breast and leaning on her long spear. She appears to have won the battle against Tyranny, portrayed as a king lying prostrate under her foot. The legend "Sic semper tyrannies," "Thus always to tyrants," is a reference to the assassination of Julius Caesar. The Confederates' only change was to put Virtus in a breastplate. They appear to have been concerned about public nudity. By 1876, Virtus was back in her traditional dress.

Over time there were several versions of the state seal. It was standardized in 1912. A few changes were made to the flag as well. The white fringe used in indoor flags was added in 1930, and the ornamental boarder of red and green Virginia creeper in 1931. The current version was standardized by the state legislature in 1950.

# September 17, 2022 - 160th Anniversary of Antietam

Circumstances prevented many from attending the 160th Anniversary day's events of Antietam, but you asked about what we did. Beside presenting a wreath and giving a speech, we donated two dozen red roses for strewing on the grounds and burial places. *The following is the speech given by President Lyd- dane at the event at Antietam National Battleground*.

On September 17, in the year 1862, our country lost 23,000 souls on this sacred ground called Antietam, which provided the necessary Union victory for President Lincoln to issue one of the most important American documents, the Emancipation Proclamation.

160 Years later, I stand here, representing the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, 1861-1865. I hold the positions of President of the Elizabeth Van Lew Detached Tent 1, Virginia, and National Counsel Member #4. We are one of five Allied Orders of the Grand Army of the Republic, whose goal is to keep green the memory. My four great-grandfathers, who fought for the Union, are with me in spirit. Also here in spirit is my dear grandfather, who counted one of his life's victories as traveling here and pondering this bloodiest battle day of our history.

Here are some words given by President Lincoln in Frederick on October 4, 1862: "I return thanks to our soldiers for the good service they have rendered, for the energies they have shown, the hardships they have endured, and the blood they have so nobly shed for this dear Union of ours; and I also return thanks not only to the soldiers, but to the good citizens of Maryland, and to all the good men and women in this land, for their devotion to our glorious cause....May our children and our children's children to a thousand generations, continue to enjoy the benefits conferred upon us by a united country."

These words are for today's soldiers and citizens of America. May they rest on our hearts as we ponder this inspiring and tragic day. And may you know that your own presence on this ground today be considered utmost in sacred honor.

# **On My Mind**



## We Reach Across the Waters in Alliance and Honor

In our October 22, 2022 meeting, a motion was made by Margaret Stromberg. This led to our unanimous vote for giving a generous donation in alliance with the SUVCW for the completion of a monument for UK Veterans of the American Civil War Association. It'll be installed in London, UK. This exemplifies our dedication in keeping green the memory.

Our UK sister Gina Denham discovered that her great-great grandfather George Denham (Co F 111th PA Volunteers) returned to England after the Civil War. He was one of the small number of other veterans who made the same decision. Most died in poverty, without any burial marker.

Gina's discovery led to "The Monumental Project." Efforts by volunteers including Co-Chair Darren Rawlings. Obtaining burial markers for James O'Neill, Co K 61st MA, and James Albermar, Co E 111th PA, from the Department of Veteran Affairs are their recent successes.

Another goal was to design and fund a symbolic monument in London, honoring those who served and those who supported the Union effort. The monument, designed by PDC Stuart Stefany of the Illinois SUVCW, has already been crafted. In alliance with the SUVCW, we are keeping green the memory in a most unique way!

## **Retreat with a Recipe—Hot Buttered Rum**

In this newsletter, we reach wwwaayyyy back to the 1650s to offer a cocktail classic made just for wintertime. It was in the 1650s when Jamaica began importing goods into Colonial America.

#### Ingredients

- 1 stick (4 ounces) unsalted butter
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup light brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon ground allspice

#### Directions

 $\Rightarrow$  In mixing bowl, combine butter, vanilla extract, sugar, spices and salt. Beat until well combined.

Pinch of salt

(optional)

2 ounces dark or aged rum

Cinnamon stick, for garnish

6 ounces hot water

- $\Rightarrow$  In heat-proof glass or mug, combine aged rum with 1 ounce (2 tablespoons) spiced butter mixture. Remaining batter can be stored in airtight container in refrigerator for future use.
- $\Rightarrow$  Top with hot water and stir until ingredients are well incorporated. Garnish with cinnamon stick if preferred.
