b. Then next discussing the Battle of Fredericksburg itself, including the bombardment and destruction of the town, the experiences of those Fredericksburg citizens who stayed behind in their homes and the looting of the city.

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Southern Memorial and Wreath Cemeteries



Portions of this plea are quoted from the letter from National Chaplain Verna Maleski.

"At the 129th National Convention in Atlanta, GA, the Southern Memorial & Wreaths Committee make a recommendation to the membership that we establish our own program. This committee shall work to place wreaths at Southern Cemeteries, as listed in our Bylaws, on Memorial Day...

For decades, members of the Women's Relief Corps created the wreaths, then boxed and shipped them to the Southern Cemeteries for placement on Memorial Day. Our only role was financial..."



There's more, but here's where we come in, and ladies, this seems aimed directly at us, for the South surely is part of us!

"We are in serious need of your help to 'adopt a cemetery' near your Tent or one that holds significance for the Sisters of your Tent. Your Tent would then take on the assignment of creating an 18 inch, grapevine wreath, decorated in patriotic colored silk flowers, box and ship it with a 28" stand to your adopted cemetery on behalf of the National DUVCW. It requires a 30" x 24" x 5 inch box for shipping. Estimate cost of this 'care package,' including shipping, is \$80-100. The wreath must be ready to ship in early May."

Now, I've committed our Tent to adopting two cemeteries, after some extremely taxing thinking and concern about them being adopted by others. My Arts Degrees will be put to use in creating these wreaths.

An anonymous donor is funding the cost. My first choice is the Culpeper National Cemetery, as it is the second one made after the Civil War, with Gettysburg being the first. It is exceptional. The second is out of state, in Grafton, West Virginia. This is the land of my Civil War ancestors, and my father's bones lie in the new cemetery just down the road. Now, you have the golden opportunity to help in many ways with this task.

I'll list the cemeteries in Verna's list, and want for you to think about this being our annual Memorial Day Project. We can choose different cemeteries each year, or adopt certain ones forever. We'll talk about this in our March meeting. This project has the great benefit of getting our DUVCW 1861-1865 organization more presence. It is one that members across the state can contribute to, and the reality of belonging our Tent in honoring those who gave all, well, ladies...'nut said. Except, this is the perfect way for you, who are so busy, too far away, too whatever, to contribute and have great pride in your decision. Will you donate to cover costs for adoption? Will you provide wreaths, silk flowers, boxes? Will you share your personal connection with one of these cemeteries in an upcoming newsletter? This can be an on-going discussion, to be firmed-up in time for not only this May, but also May 2021.

These are the National Cemeteries approved by the Grand Army of the Republic: Mobile National Cemetery (NC) (AL), Fayetteville NC (AR), Fort Smith NC (AR), Little Rock NC (AR), Barrancas NC (FL), St. Augustine NC (FL), Andersonville NC (GA), Marietta NC (GA), New Albany NC (IN), Alton NC (IL), Fort Scott NC (KS), Alexandria NC (LA), Chalmette NC (LA), Port Hudson NC (LA), Annapolis NC (MD), Antietam NC (MD), Baltimore NC (MD), Loudon Park NC (MD), Corinth NC (MS), Natchez NC (MS), Vicksburg NC (MS), Jefferson Barracks NC (MO), Springfield NC (MO), Historic Salisbury NC (NC), New Bern NC (NC), Wilmington NC (NC), Raleigh NC (NC), Wilmington NC (NC), Gettysburg NC (PA), Beaufort NC (SC), Florence NC (SC), Andrew Johnson National Historic Site (TN), Chattanooga NC (TN), Memphis NC (TN), Nashville NC (TN), Memphis NC (TN), Shiloh National Military Park (TN), Stones River National Military Park (TN), Fort Bliss NC (TX), and I separated out Virginia below. The rest are: Seven Pines NC (WA), Yorktown NC (WA) Battleground NC (Washington, D.C.), and General John A. Logan Tomb (Washington, D.C.).

Virginia National Cemeteries: Alexandria, Balls Bluff, City Point, Cold Harbor, Danville, Fort Harrison, Fredericksburg, Glendale (Richmond), Hampton, Petersburg, Seven Pines, Staunton, Winchester, Yorktown.

Do you see why I had such a hard choice? They all deserve a wreath! There's nothing saying that we can't adopt another cemetery this year, and this is why I want to hear from you at our next meeting. This opportunity has never come our way. Please note that, with every passing day, your choice may be adopted by another Tent...(no pressure here)...

You can greatly help by sending in your opinions to either Karen Misiano, our Newsletter Editor, or to myself, your President, for sharing with other members in the "Egg-citing Times," as to why you feel we should adopt one of the above cemeteries (or more!). Karen Misiano has kindly offered to get the discussion started.... "Personally, I throw my hat in for Poplar Grove National Cemetery, outside of Petersburg. My Civil War ancestor, Charles Field, under whom I joined DUVCW twenty-four years ago, was killed shortly before the war ended and never made it back to his Michigan home; he is buried at Poplar Grove. I try to visit each Memorial Day and place a Michigan flag on his grave. The cemetery is a lesser-known cemetery, tucked away down a country road, and it is deserving of our remembrance."

Let our nation know that the DUVCW 1861-1865 is serious about "Keeping Green the Memory" in our state and others that hold special significance to you! We can do this!

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Let's "Sit" in the Civil War a bit more....

From Cyndi Messick...

I have a mystery in my history, "What happened to Mary Smith?" Mary appeared in the national Census of 1860, but by 1862, her husband had sold all his property and gone off to war, a man who was too old to register and lied about his age. That eventually caught up with him, and he never saw action in the field. It has been suggested that perhaps Mary died and was buried in a local cemetery that was later relocated. I have not been able to find records to help uncover any facts.

So when I heard that Newspapers.com had a free President's Day weekend, I thought about Mary and found a local paper, hoping to perhaps find an obituary. Unfortunately, there are very few editions of the paper available and my story remains a mystery. But the paper I found from 1860 was extremely interesting! It was before the election, and the pro-Lincoln sentiment ran strong. I found the articles passionate and eloquent, and even poetry throughout.

Although I love genealogy, I'm not a history buff, so had to do some research and found that there were four candidates in the presidential election of 1860. The tickets were Lincoln/Hamlin (Republican), Breckinridge/Lane (Southern Democratic), Bell/Everett (Constitutional Union), and Douglas/Johnson (Northern Democratic). Funny to also learn that even back then, Virginia was a swing state!

The following transcriptions are from the Livingston Republican, from Livingston County, Michigan, July 17, 1860.

Union Cement

A Union-saver, brush in hand,
Made the vast tour of this broad land
To patch the Union, breaking through,
And mend the Constitution too.
He found, betwixt the North and South,
A crack wide as an earthquake's mouth,
And gave to Everett and Bell
Directions how to close it well.

Buchanan next, Alas! he found,
Prostrate and bleeding on the ground;
He'd fallen from his platform's wreck
And broken his white-bandaged neck.
This surgeon placed his head once more
Upon its trunk, wrong side before,
And glued it fast – and since that day
He looks and walks a different way.

When Cushing smashed his China ware This man of glue was passing there – It was in Mexico he fell – The crash will be remembered well,
He patched the potsherds with his glue,
And the cracked china looked like new,
Until his dishes were upset
At Charleston, where his party met.

Rotund and robust, sitting there, In the premier's uneasy chair, Our gallant Case displayed his sword – 'Twas broken like his promised word. A magic touch, a drop of glue, Repaired them both for the *review*. Alas, a drop fell on the chair, And glued our Squatter Sovereign there.

Net came a formidable job,
To stop the leakage made by Cobb;
In rivulets, like liquid gold.
The treasures from the treasury rolled.
In vain appliances were crammed –
Cobb, not the flowing tide, was damned.
Spalding himself, with all his glue,
Could not have stopped its filtering through.

He put the White House in repair,
Mended the Presidential chair,
Patched the blotched bureaus of the state,
Varnished the nominating state,
And tried to make the North and South
Cohere, by closing Freedom's mouth.

'Tis said a tall man from the West Will stop the leakage in the chest, And caulk the sinking ship of state, (For he is wise, and stout, and great) And fling out from her quivering spars, The glorious flag of stripes and stars, And save the vessel and her crew, Without the use of Union glue.

The reason the Republicans say so much of Breckinridge is, that there is not enough of Douglas to make a fight against. We cannot afford to be peppering away at a man who will not get an electoral vote.

The Courier has announced that the Democratic party is dead. Let it be buried with its face downwards, so that, if it scratch out, its re-appearance will be among the Chinese. – Louisville Journal.

Virginia. – The Washington *States* learns on good authority that those citizens of Occoquan, Prince William County, Va., who some time ago passed resolutions endorsing Republican doctrines, have been guilty of the additional enormity of raising a Lincoln and Hamlin flag-pole.

The Republican National Committee, in Washington, receive daily the most satisfactory reports from all parts of the country, and are more and more confident every day, of the election of Lincoln.
